

Cumberland Community Church's Statement on Systemic Racism & Injustice

As a community of faith deeply committed to the gospel of Jesus Christ, Cumberland Community Church affirms the God-bearing image of every person - regardless of race, gender, background, or social status. Although sinful behavior separates us from God and distorts that image, Scripture assures us that even our sin cannot erase this reality. Such a view demands that we value each person as God does, and boldly oppose the dark forces that threaten people of their dignity. We believe the gospel of Jesus Christ is a redemptive call for justice, mercy, and righteousness, not only inwardly in relation to the Creator, but also, outwardly in relation to all of creation.

"So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them." Genesis 1:27 (NIV)

Therefore, as ambassadors of Jesus Christ:

We reaffirm our calling to Biblical Unity

We are one in Christ, and therefore, we find our identity in Him. Although we are all born into a fallen world, through Christ we are "re-born" out of it. The divisions and factions that separate us and characterize our humanity become secondary for those who are born of the Spirit. This is fundamental to biblical unity, and therefore, an extreme priority for our multi-ethnic church. We embrace and engage all of our differences, and will take on the challenging tensions that entail this journey of oneness, not sameness. We will not drift towards the ease of assimilation, but rather courageously choose to honor and accommodate our cross cultural family. We will not dismiss the pains of the past, but will seek to understand, to listen, and to allow the healing that Biblical unity requires. We make our allegiance to Christ alone.

So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. Galatians 3:26-28 (NIV)



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We oppose and stand against the ideology of White Supremacy in all its forms

We dare not minimize the tragic history of our country, and its unique expression of racism. From colonialism, to slavery, to Jim Crow South, our country continues to reap what was sown from the seeds of white supremacy that were planted as foundations for this nation. Therefore, Cumberland will accept her role as a voice of Godly conscience in our society, and apply biblical truth to the occurrences of racial inequality.

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We call to account the sin of Police Brutality

We raise our voice in this cry for justice and add our agreement to the deeply emotional and truthful sentiment that Black lives matter¹. Moreover, black lives are precious, worthy and valued.
